Supporting the life of the community

Pastoral Care

Pastoral care to those at home is an important ministry and the St Edmund's Lay Elders met regularly to plan this during the vacancy. They visited housebound parishioners and took Home Communion to three people who requested it. Revd Alan Perry asked if they would visit people in Reydon, which they were pleased to do.

Following Revd Russ Gant's arrival he called together all those interested in offering pastoral care which included three additional people. It was agreed that the term Lay Elder might not be well understood, so for this aspect of ministry it might be better to be known as the Pastoral Care Team. Russ wrote a piece for Heart and Sole asking any who were interested in this work to contact him and he will run three training sessions, using the diocesan material, for new Pastoral Care volunteers. Sarah Wallington Smith has agreed to be the co-ordinator for the team.

There is a strong relationship with the residential care home at St Barnabas where the team offer a monthly communion service, a Christmas Carol service and additional communions at Christmas and Easter. Revd Philip Tarris has presided three times, and Russ is presiding in April. The residents much enjoy the service.

Eco Church

One of the five marks of Mission in the Church of England is "To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth" and the national church has committed to zero carbon by 2030. It is key that we understand these environmental challenges locally, commit to reducing our carbon footprint and engage with the wider community.

A small 'Eco group' has come together and our first priorities are:

- To monitor and understand our use of energy in the church, particularly the church heating, and to continue to explore energy efficient alternatives.
- To work with the Council, who maintain the churchyard, on ideas for the management of biodiversity, and to involve the schools and the community.
- To register the church on the 'Eco Church' national scheme and to work towards the Bronze award (recently awarded to Walberswick Church).
- To engage with the church community, and more widely through environment-based talks, monthly 'eco tips', electronic newsletter, eco prayers.

Children's work

During 2023, we saw consistent growth in the children's work and we now have around 14 children that regularly attend Sunday School. We also have a core group of people that are willing to help at Sunday School and we thank God for this provision and their faithful ministry.

This has allowed us to split the Sunday morning groups into two, with younger ones meeting in the Porch Room and older ones meeting in the Choir Vestry. The groups are led on a rota basis, allowing helpers to be present in some of the services, whilst also forming part of the Sunday School team.

We hope that during 2024, we will continue to see growth in our children's numbers and we would love to be able to split the group into three in due course, so that all of our children and young people can receive age-appropriate teaching. We will continue to pray for leaders and helpers with this.

Parent and Toddler Group

In 1985, Anne Bustin the wife of Rev Canon Peter Bustin together with Liz Bonsey a Sunday School teacher at St Edmunds started a Mother and Toddler Group which met once a week during term time at St Edmunds Church Hall. Some 39 years later the group still flourishes and many of the children we see today are the descendants of children who came to the group in years gone by, including grandparents. The group is now running under the name of Parent and Toddler Group to encourage both Mothers and Fathers to come along.

The group aims to provide the opportunity to meet new friends, to build support networks and to meet other parents in a similar situation. The children learn to socialise in a safe and friendly environment. A healthy snack is given to the children and tea, coffee and biscuits are provided for the parents.

We are fortunate enough to have a breastfeeding cafe join us twice a month to support breastfeeding Mums and their partners, and also to respond to any questions that they may have. From the modest beginnings all those years ago, we continue to serve the local community with weekly sessions, including a Christmas Party with a visit from Father Christmas and a present for each child. This party is kindly sponsored by The Southwold and Reydon Society.

Welcome and Stewarding

Open the Book

Open the Book is a national project which has been running since 1999. It operates under the auspices of the Bible Society, which provides suggested programmes and resources. A group has been running in Southwold for many years and currently enacts a bible story once a month in Southwold Primary School. In the past the group was affiliated to the group in St Margaret's, Reydon, but last year St Edmunds registered separately as this facilitates access to resources. The Reydon team also visits Reydon Primary School, once a month.

As far as possible the 10-15 minute dramas are lively and interactive, and children are always eager to take part. The team has always consisted of a small group of women from St Edmunds, but was joined in 2023 by Gary from the United Reformed Church. It's good to have a more mixed team and the impact of a taller person with a louder voice made the demise of Goliath quite impressive! If anyone would like to consider joining the team please let me know as there is sometimes a shortfall in numbers.

A happy spin-off from Open the Book is that 3 members of the team now also go into the school once a week to hear children read and occasionally to help with other activities. Thanks to Southwold Primary School for their warm welcome on all occasions.

St Edmund's Shop

The shop started about 30 years ago as a stall to encourage parishioners to buy fairly traded food items. These help marginalized people (mainly women) in the third world where climate change and economic circumstances make life extremely difficult for them. This is obviously much better than buying many standard brand goods which often rely on exploited labour. When the rear area of the church was developed a few years ago, the Revd Simon Pitcher was keen to see the stall properly housed in a way which would also provide for the sale of church-related items, such as guide books, postcards, and T-Towels. Sales continued at a steady rate during the year, and all profit (several thousand pounds a year) goes into the church's general fund, so this is also of benefit to us.

Deanery Synod

The Deanery Synod meets three times a year at different churches around the Diocese. At each meeting there is the opportunity to hear about a matter which we all need to focus on and there is also discussion of finance, staffing and vacancies. In addition, there is usually time at the end for each church to talk about items they might consider useful for other churches to hear about or for which prayer is requested. The meetings are open to everyone.

The special topics – when an invited speaker addressed us - are listed below.

- Feb 23 at Ringsfield Village Hall where Rev Alison Alder spoke about the global effects of climate change and their impact on us. She also announced the establishment of the Deanery Environmental Group which will aim to produce a newsletter. She was especially concerned that each church could work towards becoming an 'Eco church' something that the Team here is now working towards.
- June 15 at St Margaret's Church Reydon where the main emphasis was on modern day slavery and human trafficking, and the speaker was John French from Suffolk Police. This was a particularly serious meeting for all who attended as many of us felt that there was much of which we were unaware.
- Oct 23 at St Mary's Church Halesworth where we were addressed by Gary Peverley the Diocesan secretary of Finance and Rich Henderson, Archdeacon of Suffolk, with emphasis on the finances of the deanery, fund raising and the general financial challenges of the Diocese.

Handbell Group

St Edmund's Tower

The eight bells of St. Edmund's are maintained in good order and are rung every Sunday for the morning service, reminding the town that christian prayer is an important part of Southwold life. If requested, bells are rung for weddings, funerals and special events.

The main event of 2023 was the celebratory ring for the Coronation of King Charles on May 6th. Further celebration ringing welcomed Rev. Russ Gant at his Licensing service on November 21st. Quarter peals marked both events. These last approximately 45 minutes. A complete peal takes nearly 3 hours. Usually only 2 are rung each year, undertaken by Guild ringers to a very high standard. It is a joy to hear these bells being evenly struck in a sequence of over 5,000 changes.

Open Tower Day is held in the summer, attracting many visitors and is well organised by our own band. Keen to promote the art of bellringing, we encourage new recruits. Our ringing instructor has been teaching several people in the past year. Practice night is on Fridays 7.30 - 9.00 pm. The band meet socially for an annual dinner; they also enjoy a day's outing to other towers, in the autumn. The AGM is held in the spring, when all reports are circulated, approved and filed.

Choir and organ

We are hugely grateful for the choir's consistent and dedicated support across the year. Without their contribution to services, in leading the congregational singing and through the provision of a regular and varied repertoire of anthems, our worship would be the poorer.

Although our numbers remain modest, they are consistent and there are very few services where we cannot field a 4-part choir. We are also fortunate in having a number of 'supplementary' singers who we can call on when needed and our thanks go to them, also, for their support.

With the approval of the Rector and the PCC, and following a substantial financial award from the Southwold Trust, we are now in a position where we can move forward with essential works on the outdated and increasingly unreliable digital components of the organ (to also include some long overdue cleaning of the 'choir organ'). A formal quotation has been received and, following PCC approval, we are hopeful that the works can begin early autumn. It is likely that the refurbishment will take about six weeks to complete during which time the music will be piano led.
